Hypercom Lower Prices, New L4150 and Lower Cost for First Data and RBS WorldPay Key Injection

LOWER HYPERCOM PRICING

StoreNext has negotiated better Hypercom pricing and is now able to substantially reduce the prices of Hypercom terminals:

- L4250 models are now \$45-\$50 lower,
- The most popular configurations of the L4150 are down by \$30-\$35.

HYPERCOM OPTIMUM L4150 PCI PED 2.X

StoreNext is also introducing the updated L4150 PCI PED 2.x. Hypercom has engineered substantial new anti-tampering protections in this model to meet the PCI PED 2.x requirements. A new Information Sheet is available on the Brochures Page or the Hypercom All-in-One Page.


There's also an optional set of configurations that include Hypercom's Secure Keypad, which integrates neatly to the new PCI PED 2.x models. These new configurations are priced out in the bulletin, and a new Information Sheet is available on the Secure Keypad models.

- In most cases, the 2.x version costs the same or less than the prior L4150 PCI PED 1.3 model.
- **Note!** The new L4150 2.x model requires either Connected Payments or WinEPS 826.1 for compatibility.

LOWER KEY INJECTION PRICING

StoreNext can now inject the First Data Atlanta key and the RBS WorldPay key without sending the terminals out for the service. This reduces the cost of key injection for the dealer to only \$15, and also saves a leg of shipping expense and delay in turnaround.
